Message from the Chief of Police



As we transition to warmer weather, you will notice more people outdoors, more drivers on our roadways, and more general activity in our City. Each member of our community plays a significant role in the safety and protection of ourselves and others. Please make an effort to connect and maintain relationships with your neighbors, be aware of your surroundings, and take steps to reduce opportunities for crime to occur. Your police department is here to support and assist you with your concerns. When comparing 2019 and 2020 (Figure 1.), we



experienced

Colonel Jeremy Ihler a 9% increase in crime. The biggest concern remains motor vehicle theft. People create the majority of opportunities that result in theft – DO NOT leave your vehicle unattended while the motor is turned on. Only you can prevent this type of opportunity from happening. As always, we must remain vigilant in our effort to improve the quality of life in our community. Live by the code of continuous improvement. We will succeed as long as everyone works together to achieve common goals.

Crime: Data, Reporting, and Reducing

As it concerns crime within the City, we have experienced an overall average increase of 9% in crime when collectively considering homicide, rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft annually when comparing 2019 and 2020. (Figure 1.) As for crimes against persons, we have experienced annual decreases in homicide and rape and increases in robbery and assault. As for crimes against property, we have experienced decrease in burglary and larceny and an increase in motor theft. The overwhelming majority of motor vehicle thefts are a result of people leaving their vehicles running, unlocked, and unattended.

Policing starts with you – the community. You are the heart of the policing mission and we require your involvement to increase the safety and security of our community. If you observe suspicious activity, a crime about to occur, or a crime in progress

Spring Crime Prevention Tips

Spring is here and summer is fast approaching. With the warmer weather we all enjoy having the windows open and being outdoors a little more. However, this also exposes us to being victims of crime. Do your part in preventing crime. would like to share some crime prevention tips to help you stay safe:

- Keep your doors locked at all times. If you are working in the backyard, keep your front door and garage doors closed and locked, and your back doors locked if you are in the front yard. Even if you are gone for only a few minutes.
- Always remember to close and lock all windows before you leave your house or go to sleep.
- Remember to put all ladders, tools, yard equipment, bicycles, or other items away when they are not in use.
- Install motion activated lights in the front and back yards, so if someone were to approach your home the lights will automatically come on and illuminate the area.
- If you go on vacation, put some lights on timers so they will turn off and on by themselves to give the appearance that someone is home. Notify the police department to conduct vacation checks while you are away.
- Be sure to roll up your car windows, take all valuables out of the vehicle and lock your doors every time you exit the vehicle, even if it is in your own driveway.
- NEVER leave your children or pets unattended in your vehicle.
- Be good stewards of the community and watch out for your neighbors – crime prevention is most effective when everyone is involved in the effort.

Road Maintenance and Motorist Safety

As you drive the City, you will occasionally come across issues on our roadways that require attention. If you need to report repair issues, such as potholes, signals on flash or dark, and downed stop signs, there are three roadway maintenance agencies that handle these type of issues: Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT), St. Louis County Department of Transportation (DOT), and the City of Bellefontaine Neighbors (BN) Street Department. (Figure 3.) Each agency handles a different set of roadways. (Figure 2.) However, if you need to report traffic crashes, stranded motorists, and other issues regarding crime and safety on our roadways, please contact the police department.

With respect to utility and roadway repairs, along with your fellow motorists, it is your responsibility to be aware of your surroundings while driving and obey the traffic laws.

Speed is a commonly reported problem. Although speed limits are set by law by street (Figure 2.), it is your responsibility as a driver to drive safely. This means that there will be circumstances where the safe driving option is traveling at a speed lower than the speed limit. Responsible driving reduces driving-related property damage, personal injury to members of our community, and the cost of vehicle insurance.

ITS TIME TO FIX-UP, PICK-UP, CLEAN UP AND PAINT UP

REMINDERS: Trash containers should be stored behind the front wall of your property. Trash containers shouldn't be placed at the curb no earlier than 5pm on the day prior to your trash day and must be removed by 5pm on the day after collection. Grass should be no taller than 8 inches in height.

- Don't leave cut grass in the street or sidewalk
- Rake leaves - Don't rake them in the street or let them accumulate on your lawn or in the sewer
- Remove broken limbs and debris and put them in the yard waste container

Treasurer's Report

Current Key Notes from Treasurer Patrick Howard:



- As of **February 2021**, the city held a total of \$4 million in funds at the local investment banks administered by the city treasurer, mayor and city clerk.
- The annual audit for fiscal year 2019-2020 was completed and provided to the state audit department on 12/30/2020.
- The annual report due by 1/31/2021 is complete and was filed with Gilmore & Bell, P.C.
- The City has received the remaining 50% of Cares Act Funds from STL County. (\$373,426.50) in February.
- Revenue Notes:

- o Annualized sales tax revenue is trending above budget.
- o Licenses, Fines & Rec Center revenue are down due to COVID.
- o Overall, current annualized revenue is trending above budget due to the receipt of CARES act funds.

- Expense Notes: o

- o General Fund

- All departments are operating at or below total budget YTD.
 - In person services are still trending below budget due to the pandemic.
- Indirect expenses overall are below budget by 25%. This excludes payroll, insurance and employee related taxes

- o Capital Fund

- Rec Center is below budget YTD. Budgeted pool repairs haven't started yet but are planned to begin before fiscal year end.
- Police Dept is above budget but a budget amendment for the new vehicles will adjust expected budget spend for the fiscal year.

- o Debt Fund

- Expenses related to the debt fund have been paid for the fiscal year.

- Overall Financial Health: o The city has solid liquidity to meet short-term obligations or those due within the current fiscal year, considering the recovery of loss revenue from the CARES Act funds.
